

Universal Magnet Fishing Safety & Legality Checklist

This checklist is designed to help magnet fishing enthusiasts ensure a safe and legal experience. Always prioritize safety and respect local regulations.

Before You Go

- ☐ **Research Local Laws:** Check state, county, and city regulations for your specific magnet fishing location. Pay attention to rules regarding public waterways, state parks, and historical sites.
- ☐ **Permits:** Determine if any permits are required (e.g., Indiana DNR permit, Illinois fishing license for some areas). Obtain all necessary permits before starting.
- ☐ **Private Property:** If magnet fishing near private land, obtain explicit permission from the landowner.
- ☐ **Weather Check:** Ensure safe weather conditions. Avoid strong currents, storms, or extreme temperatures.
- ☐ **Inform Someone:** Let a friend or family member know where you are going and when you expect to return.

Essential Gear

- ☐ **Strong Magnet & Rope:** Ensure your magnet is securely attached to a durable rope.

- ☐ **Phone (Fully Charged):** For emergencies and reporting finds.

During Magnet Fishing

- ☐ **Safety First:** Always wear gloves. Be aware of your surroundings, especially boat traffic, slippery banks, and submerged hazards.
- ☐ **Respect the Environment:** Do not damage natural habitats. Properly dispose of all trash, both what you find and what you bring.
- ☐ **Handle Finds Carefully:** Exercise extreme caution with all retrieved items. Assume unknown objects could be dangerous.
- ☐ **Historical/Archaeological Finds:** If you believe you have found a historical artifact, leave it in place if possible, document its location, and report it to local historical societies or authorities. Do NOT attempt to clean or restore it.

What to Do with Dangerous Finds

- ☐ **DO NOT TOUCH:** If you find firearms, unexploded ordnance (UXO), hazardous materials, or anything suspicious, **DO NOT TOUCH IT.**
- ☐ **Secure the Area:** If safe to do so, mark the location and keep others away.
- ☐ **IMMEDIATELY Call 911:** Contact local law enforcement or emergency services. Provide them with the exact location and a clear description of the item.
- ☐ **Wait for Authorities:** Remain at a safe distance until emergency personnel arrive.

Interaction with Law Enforcement

- ☐ **Be Respectful & Cooperative:** If approached by law enforcement or park rangers, be polite and cooperative.
- ☐ **Explain Your Activity:** Clearly state that you are magnet fishing and are aware of local regulations.
- ☐ **Show Permits (if applicable):** Present any required permits or licenses.
- ☐ **Follow Instructions:** Comply with any instructions given by authorities.

Post-Fishing

- ☐ **Clean Up:** Ensure your fishing spot is cleaner than when you arrived.
- ☐ **Dispose Properly:** Take all trash and scrap metal to appropriate disposal or recycling facilities.

- ☐ **Report Significant Finds:** Follow up with authorities regarding any historical or dangerous items reported.
